What you need to bring everyday:

- Your skis and boots. These should be well maintained and tuned. Have these kept off the mountain for the three days in case of a change in ski area due to weather.
- Warm, waterproof clothing including helmet and gloves. You'll be outside for the days for up to 6 hours.
- Sunglasses/goggles and sun cream.
- A packed lunch or lunch money.
- Money for lift tickets. Some participants may be eligible for discounted lift tickets during courses. Please inform the Ski Course Manager if lift tickets are required.
- A notebook & pencil to take down notes/important points.

Daily Procedure

The days start at 9am when we meet at the designated meeting area at the bottom of the mountain. Meeting locations are as follows:

Coronet Peak - Outside on the café Deck near the clock

Remarkables- Outside main building uphill side on snow to the left side of the deck

Cardrona –Outside on the uphill side of the archway

Treble Cone - Base of the six-man chairlift

Mt.Hutt - Outside on snow beside the café deck near the ski racks

Turoa - Outside Café at base area near the ski racks

Whakapapa - Outside Café at base area near the ski racks

Closed Days

If the mountain is closed gather at the designated meeting point at 9:00am. An alternative arrangement of another mountain in the region will be organised. Due to closed or delayed start days, the guidelines may be adjusted to create the best result for the situation.

Please have your equipment off the mountain in case another mountain is used. Meeting locations are as follows:

Methven - Mt Hutt town office

NZSIA Ski Free Ski Introduction - Course Outline

The focus of this one-day course is an introduction to Free skiing for ski instructors. Free Ski Introduction is open to NZSIA Level 1 Certified Ski Instructors (or foreign Equivalent from ISIA member country) who are Full or Associate members of the NZSIA. This course will introduce the variety of the skills needed in pipe and park situations Helmets are required for this event

Twin Tip skis are recommended but not required for this event

- This course will focus on safety procedures habits and etiquette required in the terrain parks and natural terrain features.
- The course will cover teaching basic Park and Pipe skills.
- The course will introduce some personal Free Ski skills that are used in the Park and Pipe
- This course starts with an online course that must be completed 48 hours before the start of the on snow day.

Course Philosophy

The course is first & foremost designed to be an educational & inspirational experience. Participants will be introduced to & gain a degree of understanding how to adapt their teaching to natural terrain features, and basic park and pipe features.

It is intended to be a fun, interactive & practical experience by work-shopping through information & tools for instructors to better understand and enhance their current teaching methods.

The on snow topics that will be covered during the Course

- Safety is paramount
- Pipe & Park, safety & etiquette
- Position & balance
- Natural terrain and basic terrain features
- Butter moves, flat land tricks, 180s,360s, ollie's & nollies
- Switch-Wedge Turn, Wedge Parallel, Basic parallel
- Basic jumps
- Introductory rail features

Terrain:

Easy green terrain as well as small natural features and introductory level (small) terrain park and half pipe or natural transition skiing (depending on availability)

Assessment areas

- Switch basic parallel Flatland spins both ways
- Tip and tail butters
- Basic Jump
- Old School tricks
- Transitional Features in the Pipe or natural side walls
- 50/50 on introductory rail features
- Progression building for Free Ski using the Static –Active –Complex –Whole Model. This will be done in a round robin format where each candidate individually builds on a Free Skiing progression that has been put to the group by the Examiner
- Knowledge and application of park safety and etiquette will be continually assessed throughout the day and via the <u>Online course then this is to be completed 48 hours before the beginning of Day One on snow.</u>
 A minimum score of 60% is required to pass the online course

On Line Course

This is an open book assessment.

Certification Scoring Criteria

The Free Ski Introduction will be internally assessed by your examiner during the day

The assessment for this course is made up of -online Course, Safety, Free Skiing and Teaching components as listed above. Candidates must pass all assessment areas. Results will be delivered in the format below.

- "Meets the Standard" Teaching and Free Skiing both demonstrate understanding and competency in all of the key criteria to a level that would be acceptable in a lesson for Free Skiing.
- "Does Not Meet the Standard" Either Teaching and or Free skiing did not demonstrate sufficient understanding and/or competency in all of the key criteria and therefore would not be acceptable for teaching a Lesson for Free Skiing.
